Housing Justice

Our Housing Justice practice has continued to be a corner stone of the work of the service.

Over the last 12 months, as cost of living pressure increases, we have seen an increase in demand in relation to rent arrears, rent increases, evictions and repairs.

We have continued to ensure that our services are accessible by establishing outreaches at the Flemington Library and the Djerring Hub. We have also continued our partnership with coHealth at the public housing high rise buildings at 29 Crown Street and 94 Ormond Street.

To support these outreaches, our Bicultural Workers have developed resources in community languages to strengthen the communities' knowledge of their tenancy rights.

A key focus of the Housing Justice team has been to work closely with the integrated services team to ensure that clients receive wrap around support. This integrated approach has meant that our social workers have been able to address the underlying issues behind the legal problems and in doing so work towards lasting change in clients' lives.



Jane's story

Jane is a community member who came to MVLS at a time when she was at imminent risk of being evicted from her home.

Jane lived in public housing and was thousands of dollars behind in her rent. It was really hard for her to get on top of the rent issue without help because she was also managing complex mental health conditions and was a victim-survivor of family violence. She also did not have her own bank account, or the identification cards/documents needed to open a new one.

Our Integrated Services Lead worked with Jane to get new ID documents which allowed her to open her own bank account. MVLS also supported Jane to apply for funding to pay off the bulk of her rent arrears.

With a lump sum paid, our tenancy lawyer was then able to negotiate a payment plan with the Housing Provider to pay off the remaining debt. This kept Jane in safe and secure housing.

Since this time, MVLS have kept in touch with Jane and supported her to get on top of energy bills and connected her with an employed support service. Jane showed great resilience in enduring these challenges, and in seeking out help to address them.

Jane has not always found it easy to stay engaged with service providers, but the place-based and integrated nature of the MVLS service made it accessible for her.



Safe from Harm

Our Safe from Harm team has been extremely busy over the past 12 months; 31% of all women who accessed our service experienced or were at risk of experiencing family violence.

Many of these women had complex and intersecting needs including speaking English as a second language and experiencing intellectual or physical disabilities. We also saw clients that were experiencing systems abuse or had been misidentified by police.

In partnership with Moonee Valley City Council, MVLS continued to coordinate the Moonee Valley Family Violence Network; a multi-agency forum where local government and community agencies work together to address family violence and improve the safety of women and children.

Our organisation has continued our strong partnership with Broadmeadows and Sunshine Family Relationship Centres to offer fortnightly Legally Assisted Family Dispute Resolution sessions (LAFDRS). Over the last year we assisted 26 families with mediation. This early intervention initiative has been extremely effective in assisting parents to establish effective parenting plans and avoid the stress, time and expense associated with the Family Court.

We are grateful for the support of Women's Legal Service who supported our lawyers through the family law capacity-building program. This support has allowed our lawyers to extend the scope of work offered by the service to family law clients.

Health Justice Partnership

We continued our long-standing relationship with Wellways Prevention and Recovery Care (PARC) program in Travancore, which has now entered its seventh year.

PARC offers short-term residential support for people experiencing mental health issues. Our lawyers attend a weekly outreach to offer drop-in support for people with legal concerns. In the last year, we supported 20 clients with a range of issues, including fines, tenancy, separation and criminal matters. Our presence is an important factor in preventing the escalation of legal issues and ensuring that people receive accessible and timely support.

Economic Justice

With 85% of our clients experiencing financial disadvantage, economic justice is a key focus for our legal team and our integrated services team.

For these clients who are already experiencing financial disadvantage, debt associated with a motor vehicle accident or a fine can be debilitating. Over the last year MVLS saw a 35% increase in those seeking legal advice regarding fines and infringements.

MVLS continued to be supported by the co-locating services of Latitude (youth homelessness support), and an Elder Abuse Specialist Worker and a Financial Counsellor from Better Place Australia. MVLS clients also had access to co-located services at Wingate, including Centrelink, Reconnect employment/education support, counselling and food relief. We are extremely grateful for the ongoing support of these organisations and the material difference they make to the lives of our clients.





Community and Partnerships

The Integrated Services team continued to provide a vital point of connection for community members with non-legal support needs, as well as local service providers, local government and strategic projects.

MVLS clients who received support from the integrated services team very rarely presented with just one non-legal concern. Key themes that emerged this year were around community-led enhancement of community safety, family violence prevention, housing security and severe financial hardship.

MVLS have proudly grown our integrated services team over the last year. In 2024, we launched the Bicultural Worker Program, building on the foundation laid by the Legal Concierge initiative. This program was designed to empower bicultural workers with the skills and confidence to thrive in the legal sector while strengthening connections between MVLS and the diverse communities of Moonee Valley.

We welcomed three exceptional team members—Meron, Nabiha, and Kowthar. Their ability to communicate in multiple languages and their cultural expertise have fostered trust and improved access to legal services for CALD communities in Flemington and Ascot Vale. A key initiative this year was the Storytelling

Project with Flemington public housing communities. MVLS captured powerful stories from residents and former residents of the Flemington flats, offering insight into the proposed redevelopment of public housing towers. Bicultural workers played a pivotal role in interviewing and transcribing these stories, leveraging cultural trust to gather narratives often missed by formal inquiries. The Bicultural Workers have also hosted Bring Your Bills Days, Housing Complaints Clinics and Morning Tea with a lawyer.

Led by our Community Lead, MVLS also helped establish and coordinate the Flemington Residents Action Group (FRAG), originally part of the Flemington Works collective led by Moonee Valley City Council. In collaboration with the Victorian Public Tenants Association and local tenants, FRAG advocates for residents of the Flemington estate. The group has successfully addressed issues such as the loss of communal rooms and facilitated Victoria Ombudsman Days in response to resident complaints.

Nabiha's Story

The Bicultural Worker is a role required to connect the culturally and linguistically diverse communities with Australian communities.

The new arrivals who have a language barrier face the most difficulty when settling in Australia. To settle in any country, people require an understanding of the way of living, the education system, workforce, and how to connect with services in the community. Not understanding the rules, not being able to access the justice system and not understanding their rights can put them in challenging circumstances.

Being a Bicultural worker is rewarding because we get to work with people who need support and have experienced trauma and come from both financially and socially disadvantaged backgrounds. We can offer specialised support by communicating with them in their language and a culturally acceptable way. We can help connect them with the services that can help solve their issues, which is a great feeling.

The amazing part is the lived experience I have and ability to speak five languages,

which makes me feel successful in carrying out the job.

Working as a bicultural worker not only gave me the opportunity to help the community but also helped me develop myself. I have become a confident advocator and communicator who can stand for the clients to get results such as their bills waved or reduced, connected to the right services, payment plans.

The community has noticed our presence of bicultural workers. It has made a big difference in the way they receive and communicate with services, and they don't feel judged for not knowing the language. The clients feel that they have unlimited freedom and a sense of belonging.

If the bicultural support is removed from the MVLS service, the community members will lose their confidence to access the service. It will result in difficulty to serve justice and lead to unfairness. The bicultural work is unmeasurable.

Max's Story

As a Volunteer Paralegal at MVLS I have witnessed the importance of access to free legal services. At MVLS the focus is squarely on the people of its community, listening to their issues and helping them navigate a system that is often working against them.

The placement has allowed me to support lawyers in client interviews, draft legal documents, and prepare notes, but the most meaningful part has been talking directly with clients. Many are dealing with issues like family violence, tenancy problems or fines, and often have nowhere else to turn. Helping someone feel heard and supported has been incredibly rewarding.

The work here is vital because it fills a gap for people who may not otherwise have access to legal help. I have witnessed the powerful impact of empathy and clear communication, and not only strengthened my own skills but also reinforced my commitment to ensuring the law serves everyone, not just those who can afford it.

This experience has allowed me to grow, not only as a future lawyer but as a person and I am proud to have contributed, even in a small way, to the important work MVLS does in its community.

Treasurer Report

At the end of the financial year, we remained in a strong financial position after recording an operating surplus of \$10,870 and with a healthy cash reserve. This was thanks to the leadership and careful financial management of our previous Manager, Brett Morton, Acting Manager, Erin Lockington, and the planning and oversight of our Finance Officer, Jan Thorpe.

At the conclusion of the financial year, we had term deposits totaling \$184,009 which means that we are well placed regarding our ongoing financial viability and the ability to continue to support our current programs and future initiatives.

Finally, we were grateful for the support that we received from our core funding sources administered by Community Legal Services Program (CLSP) on behalf of the Commonwealth and State Governments, plus City of Moonee Valley, the Federal Maribyrnong Electorate Office of Bill Shorten (former MP) and Jo Briskey MP, the Essendon State Office of Danny Pearson MLA, the Niddrie State Office of Ben Carroll, Deputy Premier, and Victoria Legal Aid (VLA).
